

Saskatchewan's Cellphone Legislation

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Using a hand-held cellphone while driving for: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • making or receiving phone calls • sending, receiving or reading text messages • sending, receiving or reading emails • surfing the Internet • using 10-4 "push to talk" technology • Hands-free cellphone devices while driving for new drivers¹ 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Hands-free use of cellphones while driving for experienced drivers², including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • devices that clip to the visor • headsets, either wired or wireless • voice-activated devices • devices built into the vehicle, such as OnStar or those with Bluetooth technology • Bluetooth earpieces • One-touch activation of a speakerphone feature on a cellphone placed within easy reach • Making 9-1-1 calls on cellphones while driving, for both new and experienced drivers • Making a call on a cellphone when parked on the side of the road, for both new and experienced drivers 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Electronic devices that are not cellphones, including but not limited to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • GPS • CB radios • two-way radios • MP3 players/iPods • satellite radio <p>Note: Law enforcement still has the ability to charge distracted drivers with driving without due care and attention if they are putting themselves or other road users at risk.</p>

¹ New drivers are drivers in Saskatchewan's Graduated Driver's Licensing (GDL) program.

² Experienced drivers are all drivers other than those in the GDL program.
